These were the forms of storytelling:


- being read to



THEATRE


The theatre programme run by Anvitha Prakash has been a super hit for the Grade 6 and 7 children.

It is also an opportunity for us to bring children of diverse backgrounds together while focusing on a specific activity.








ASSESSMENTS

As you can see it is evident that children have a marked improvement in their foundational reading skills.




ASSESSMENTS
